Report of the Directors For the Year ended 31 March 2018

The trustees who are also the directors present their annual report and financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 March 2018.

The financial statements comply with the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005, the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended), the Companies Act 2006, the Memorandum and Articles of Association and Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Ireland (FRS102).

Objectives

The objects of Kindred Advocacy are:

To promote the relief of families of children and young people affected by ill-health or disability; and, to promote equality and diversity by advocacy and campaigning on behalf of families of disabled children and young people for better access to public facilities.

Activities

From 1st April 2017 – 31st March 2018, Kindred worked with 825 families providing information, advocacy and emotional support. Although we worked with less families than the previous year, we supported an increased number of families with a child with complex needs. Of the 825 families, 343 (42%) had a child with a complex medical or life limiting condition. This was an increase on last year when we worked with 297 complex needs families (29% of last year's total families). This picture reflects Kindred's policy of focussing our service on children with more complex medical needs.

60% of families we support are on low income and we made 197 applications for Disability Living Allowance (DLA) and 229 applications for Carers Allowance. These activities help to lift many families out of poverty as DLA increases a family's income by £21.80 - £139.75 per week, depending on the level of need of the child.

We supported 115 families at Child or Young Person's Planning Meetings (sometimes attending as many as 8 meetings per family in the year) and supported 111 families to find suitable housing, or with housing adaptation. Staff assisted parents to make 48 placing requests for specialist schooling. We assisted 109 families with liaison with social work (including Self Directed Support) and we supported 206 families in liaison with health professionals.

This year we provided a wider range of support and information groups for parents. We also provided free counselling to parents, with more than 30 parents using the counselling service. Our new Therapeutic Support Group has developed a regular attendance and runs once a term for eight sessions. We have also applied for 420 trust fund grants for families raising £229,227 for aid and adaptations and equipment (for example, sleep systems, specialist baths and beds).

Achievements and Performance

Our 27th year, ending 31st March 2018, was our most successful to date in terms of income as we raised £565,903 in grants and charitable contributions. However, we also experienced the loss of four major funders and our five year Big Lottery Fund project (Resilience for Parent Carers in Fife) came to an end. As a result of loss of funding we have had to undergo major cuts to our staff team and we continue to cope with the repercussions of loss of long term funding. Staff are very committed to Kindred and we are working as a team to find new and innovative ways of funding our charity.

Achievements and Performance Continued

We supported 222 families at the Royal Hospital for Sick Children in Edinburgh. Over a quarter of the parents had a child in Paediatric Intensive Care. We find that parents need someone to talk to when they are frightened and isolated and three of our staff are trained in counselling skills. We are very grateful for long term support for our work at the hospital from the Cordis Trust and from NHS Lothian. We are delighted to receive a new grant from the Robertson Charitable Trust. It is a measure of the hard work of our hospital team that they successfully applied for 309 charitable trusts for families, raising £137,787 in twelve months. They also supported 11 families who had experienced bereavement and each of whom received a great deal of time and care from our team.

We continued with our Big Lottery Fund grant of £74,445, with the support of consultant, Claire Edwards (former Director of SNIP). we are working in partnership with the Managed Clinical Network for Children with Exceptional Healthcare Needs (CEN) which is a network of 600 professionals. Our staff are involved in an innovative programme of consultation of families of children which Exceptional Healthcare Needs to inform the work of CEN. Our events are taking place across Scotland including a Parliamentary event hosted by Jenny Gilruth MSP. The project supported families from 19 local authority areas across Scotland.

Our Community & Helpline Team in Edinburgh provided support to 358 families with a very wide range of needs. Our work involved supporting 36 families to make placing requests for specialist schooling. We provided events for parents of children aged 14 and over who were transitioning into adult services, funded by the Scottish Government through their programme to support Self Directed Support. In Fife our staff supported 175 families caring for children with additional support needs. Of these children 84 have life-limiting or complex needs. We have seen an increase in complexity of need in our Fife project and we have adapted our project to cope with demand for the service

Our FaceBook following reached over 2,000 followers. We have made progress this year with our website with thanks to some exceptional volunteers: Calum MacÙisdean (technical assistance) and Malcolm Cochrane (photographs, courtesy of Inspiring Scotland). Jenny Harris is our loyal office volunteer and fundraiser. We are grateful to the Royal Botanic Garden Edinburgh and to the R S MacDonald Charitable Trust for the use of venues for meetings. Jane Gray, Jock Encombe and Ron Watson provided invaluable guidance and support.

Treasurer's Report (Financial review)

In the year ending 31st March 2018 our income has risen to £565,903 and we have managed a small increase in reserves to £78,232. Our expenditure was £536,781 compared with £487,227 the previous year.

Income from Scottish Government included a grant of £64,000; £32,000 for our Exceptional Families Project and £32,000 for Social Media & Fundraising. We raised just under £55,000 in donations and fundraising activities thanks to the efforts of our fundraising team. We received funding from City of Edinburgh Council: £26,835 for our helpline; £22,902 towards our advocacy. This funding, along with our Let's Talk ASN project, has allowed us to develop our expertise in Additional Support for Learning.

Our Hospital Team will be moving to our prestigious new home at the new children's hospital, the Royal Hospital for Children and Young People. We are grateful to NHS Lothian for their contribution of £9,236 (via resource transfer from City of Edinburgh Council) and for providing us with office accommodation. Later in the year, NHS Lothian stepped in to assist our organisation with additional funding of £30,000 and have committed to recurrent funding of £40,000 per annum. Edinburgh Children's Hospital Charity (ECHC) have generously funded two of our projects (hospital support for parents and counselling). We completed our third year of funding from the Cordis Charitable Trust and we are very grateful for the generous grant received and we are delighted that the Trust have decided to continue their grant funding to our hospital team. We also received a new and substantial grant of £19,000 per annum for three years from the Robertson Trust.

Treasurer's Report (Financial review) Continued

We are now into our second year of a two year award of £74,445 per annum to establish a national presence in collaboration with the National Managed Clinical Network for Children with Exceptional Healthcare Needs (CEN) and this funding contributed towards our Glasgow team.

We have been greatly assisted by the expertise of the Finance Department at Ark Housing Association who provide Kindred with financial management. Their help and guidance has been invaluable.

In summary, although we lost grants earlier in the year we have taken steps to reduce our expenditure and we are delighted to have received new grants from the Robertson Trust, RS Macdonald Charitable Trust, Henry Duncan Grants, St James's Place, and NHS Lothian.

Statement of Cash Flows

Cash flows are inherently subject to variation from year to year as a result of the timing differences between the receipt and payment of income and expenditure and their recognition in the financial statements. The 2017 increase and 2018 decrease in bank funds reflect these timing differences. With reference to the Statement of Cash Flows on page 12 the level of bank funds held reduced by £12,122 (2017 – increase £82,527) in the year to £137,894 (2017 – £150,016).

Reserves Policy

The directors consider that the aim should be for free reserves to be at a level of at least three months of running costs in order to allow the charity to operate from year to year. Free reserves have increased in the year to £74,649 which represents just over seven weeks of running costs. The directors are aware that this is insufficient and are committed to adding to this level.

Plans for Future Periods

In February 2019, our Hospital Team will be moving to our prestigious new home at the new children's hospital, the Royal Hospital for Children and Young People.

Despite the challenges, the trustees are keen for Kindred to retain all of our current 12 staff. We are therefore working to replace our income. In view of the rapidly decreasing availability of charitable grant funding we are looking at the viability of generating our own fundraising. Kindred's hospital service is currently featured in STV Children's Appeal (5 October 2018). We are conducting a strategic review with a sustainability consultant (Graeme Reekie, Wren & Grevhound).

Structure, Governance and Management

Kindred Advocacy is a charitable company limited by guarantee and is governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association dated 14 October 2011. The liability of each member is limited to £1. Kindred Advocacy is a registered charity with the Office of the Scottish Charity Regulator (OSCR).

Structure

The company will have no less than three and no more than ten directors who shall be responsible for the management of the company's business. At any one time at least two directors are to be parents of children with additional needs. The directors may be elected at any general meeting of the company or appointed by the other directors.

The board of directors appoints a Director of Operations, carries out financial management and is available to assist the Director of Operations. The Director of Operations is responsible for the day to day management of the charity's activities. The board meets on a regular basis, on average seven times a year, to examine financial and operational matters. All staff have access to the board.

Recruitment of Directors

The directors are appointed to maintain a balance of skills within the board of directors.

Structure, Governance and Management (Continued)

Induction and Training of Directors

An induction programme, which includes a day spent shadowing staff, training and publications are made available to committee members to assist them to carry out their duties and understand their responsibilities. They take part in an annual development day when they review organisational strategy and their role in implementing that strategy.

Pay Policy for Senior Staff

The key management of the charity consists of a Director of Operations, Development Manager and four Advocacy Managers. Their salaries are set each year with regard to equivalent positions in similar organisations.

Risk Management

The trustees have a risk management strategy which comprises:

- an annual review of the principal risks and uncertainties that the charity face;
- the establishment of policies, systems and procedures to mitigate those risks identified in the annual review; and
- the implementation of procedures designed to minimise or manage any potential impact on the charity should those risks materialise.

This work has identified that financial sustainability is the major financial risk for the charity. A key element in the management of financial risk is a regular review of available liquid funds and regular preparation of management accounts and comparison with budgets.

Statement of Directors' Responsibilities

The directors are responsible for preparing the directors' report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and regulations.

Company law requires the directors to prepare financial statements for each financial year. Under that law the directors have elected to prepare the financial statements in accordance with United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice (United Kingdom Accounting Standards and applicable law). Under company law the directors must not approve the financial statements unless they are satisfied that they give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the company and of the profit or loss of the company for that period. In preparing the financial statements the directors are required to:

- Select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently.
- · Make judgements and accounting estimates that are reasonable and prudent.
- Observe the methods and principles in the Charities Statement of Recommended Practice.
- Prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the company will continue in business.

The directors are responsible for keeping adequate accounting records that are sufficient to show and explain the company's transactions and disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the company and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006, the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 and the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended). They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

The trustees are responsible for the maintenance and integrity of the charity and financial information included on the charity's website. Legislation in the United Kingdom governing the preparation and dissemination of financial statements may differ from legislation in other jurisdictions.

Opinion

1. Statutory Information

Kindred Advocacy is a private company, limited by guarantee with charitable status and registered in Scotland. The company's registration number and registered office address can be found at page 4.

The presentation currency of the financial statements is the Pound Sterling (£).

2. Accounting Policies

The principal accounting policies adopted, judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty in the preparation of the financial statements are as follows:

a) Basis of Accounting

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102) (effective 1 January 2015) – (Charities SORP (FRS 102), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Companies Act 2006.

Kindred Advocacy meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy note(s).

b) Going concern

The financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis as the trustees believe this is appropriate. The trustees have considered the level of funds held and the expected level of income and expenditure for a period of 12 months from authorising these financial statements. There is a material uncertainty surrounding the level of future grant funding that may cast significant doubt on the company's ability to continue as a going concern. In response a sensitivity analysis has been performed which indicates that a restructuring of the charity's activities may be required to secure the financial position of the charity. Contingency plans are in place in order to achieve this and the budgeted income and expenditure is considered sufficient with the level of reserves for the charity to be able to continue as a going concern.

c) Donated services

In accordance with the Charities SoRP (FRS102) general volunteer time is not recognised in the accounts. Information regarding the contribution of volunteers is provided in the Report of the Directors.

d) Income

Income is attributable to the one continuing activity to promote the relief of families of children and young people affected by ill-health or disability; and, to promote equality and diversity by advocacy and campaigning on behalf of families of disabled children and young people for better access to public facilities

All income is recognised once the charity has entitlement to the income, there is sufficient certainty of receipt and so it is probable that the income will be received, and the amount of income receivable can be measured reliably.

Donations and grants are recognised when they have been communicated in writing with notification of both the amount and settlement date. In the event that a donation or grant is subject to conditions that require a level of performance before the charity is entitled to the funds, the income is deferred and not recognised until either those conditions are fully met, or the fulfilment of those conditions is wholly within the control of the charity and it is probable that those conditions will be fulfilled in the reporting period.

The charity receives contract income for the provision of its services. Contract income is recognised when the charity has entitlement after any performance conditions have been met, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably. If entitlement is not met then these amounts are deferred.

Donated professional services and donated facilities are recognised as income when the charity has control over the item, any conditions associated with the donated item have been met, the receipt of economic benefit from the use by the charity of the item is probable and that economic benefit can be measured reliably. In accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102), general volunteer time is not recognised and the trustees' annual report provides information about their contribution.

On receipt, donated professional services and donated facilities are recognised on the basis of the value of the gift to the charity which is the amount the charity would have been willing to pay to obtain services or facilities of equivalent economic benefit on the open market; a corresponding amount is then recognised as expenditure in the period of receipt.

Income received in advance of a service being provided is deferred until the criteria for income recognition are met.

e) Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably.

All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis. All expenses, including support costs and governance costs, are allocated or apportioned to the applicable expenditure headings in the statement of financial activities.

The support of fundraising activities is minimal and so all support costs have been allocated to expenditure on charitable activities.

f) Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used on any activity within the charitable objectives of the charity.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is in the notes to the financial statements.

g) Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Expenditure over £500 is capitalised as a fixed asset where it represents either a new fixed asset or enhancement to an existing asset. Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates and charged to the Unrestricted Fund in order to write off each asset over its expected useful life less estimated residual value.

Equipment

25% straight line

h) Impairment

Assets not measured at fair value are reviewed for any indication that the asset may be impaired at each balance sheet date. If such indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset, or the asset's cash generating unit, is estimated and compared to the carrying amount. Where the carrying amount exceeds its recoverable amount, an impairment loss is recognised in profit or loss unless the asset is carried at a revalued amount where the impairment loss is a revaluation decrease.

i) Debtors and creditors receivable / payable within one year

Debtors and creditors with no stated interest rate and receivable or payable within one year are recorded at transaction price. Any losses arising from impairment are recognised in expenditure.

j) Cash in bank and in hand

Cash at bank and cash in hand includes cash and short term highly liquid investments.

k) Pensions

The company operates a defined contribution scheme. Contributions are charged to the Income and Expenditure Account in the year they arise.

I) Taxation

No provision for corporation tax is necessary as the company has charitable status and does not trade. The company suffers input VAT on some of its expenditure which it does not recover.

m) Operating leases

Rentals payable under operating leases are charged to the Income and Expenditure Account on a straight line basis over the period of the lease.

n) Prior year adjustment

The accounts for the year ended 31 March 2017 showed the restricted Parent Counselling fund as being fully spent. This has been corrected to show a balance available of £7,588 and an adjustment has been made to reflect this.
